Highland Afghan Resettlement Initiative Needs Your Help: A young Afghan woman whom Highland resettled in Lancaster in 2021 now has an opportunity to bring the rest of her family to the US. Sahar's father is a doctor who, while vaccinating children in Afghanistan for the World Health Organization, was kidnapped, tortured, and held for ransom by the Taliban. He managed to escape and fled with his wife and four children to Pakistan. We learned this week that through a government organization called Welcome Corps, Sahar can be reunited with her family If she can get a Sponsorship Group AND part of the initial \$15,000 cost by **July 31**st. We have the group together (woo hoo!) but need your help with the finances. 

The GPS team met on June 24th to review the draft of our five year plan. We have some exciting news! Some "low hanging fruits" were identified during our discernment process in the categories of mission, discipleship, and worship. These "low hanging fruits" are easily achievable dreams and will give us a chance to get started and build momentum.

During the process, the team reviewed and established action goals for each category. It is our hope that through worship, we can praise God who fully sees us and truly loves us; through mission, we serve God by seeing and loving our neighbors and the Earth in the way that God does; and through discipleship, we lead everyone, (children, youth, and adults,) into a relationship with God who yearns to know us intimately.

Some of the low hanging fruit include enhancing and focusing on current missions, strengthening our youth and intergenerational fellowship, getting to know our neighbors, assessing our current facilities and physical space, understanding our member's interests, talents, and needs, creating new stewardship opportunities, and expanding our music programs.

We understand in order for the plan to be successful all of us must build upon our strengths, stay true to Highland's DNA, honor our legacies of music, worship, and mission, and strive to live out our vision statement. While we go on this journey as a congregation and church, we must allow for organic changes, experimentation, adjustments of the plan, feedback opportunities, and be realistically ambitious.

Committee Spotlight The Highland Quilters are a group of women who create quilted items. Some of the items are baby quilts, full size quilts, lap quilts, placemats, table runners, wall hangings, microwave bowls and pot holders.

> Quilts are made both by individuals and as a group. Quilts are presented to babies at Highland upon baptism and homeowners on Highland's mission trips. Baby quilts are also given to first time mothers through a social program at LGH. When quilts are sold, the proceeds are given to nonprofits that benefit women and children. Monies are given to Highland, the Lancaster Community and Internationally. The Quilters meet every Wednesday morning from 9 to noon including a group lunch. The Quilters are made up of all sewing levels from beginners to highly skilled quilters. Everyone is welcome to visit and/or

join the group. Juanita Fowler is the point person and staff support is Pastor Ann.

This week we also spotlight the **Food and Fellowship committee**, which serves food at Highland events large and small, including funeral/memorial luncheons, Sunday morning after service receptions, various church-wide events like Rally day, the Senior Christmas party and PW Christmas tea. The volunteers are notified of an event day and time by email and if someone is available, they sign up. Linda Brackbill is the head of Food and Fellowship.

Stewardship During the Summer Months Highland's ministry, missions, and operations – along with the expenses that are connected with them – continue during the summer months.

MISSION & OUTREACH CORNER

Volunteer opportunities: Below you will find an array of ways to help serve others and get to know your fellow Highland members as you work together. Please consider volunteering for one of these opportunities. Check below if any interest you. The contact names are listed, or you can call the church office who will put you in touch with the lead person of each committee or by calling the church office at 717-569-2651.

Arch Street - Arch Street is one of the local missions that Highland supports. It is a daily program for adults living with serious mental illness. Once a month Highland provides a meal for Arch Street. This involves making a casserole and/or cookies at home, then bringing it to the church where Linda Neumann will pick it up and deliver it to Arch Street



Caring Meals - These meals are under the Deacons' umbrella. When someone has been hospitalized or for some other reason is unable to prepare meals, one or two meals are brought to their home. Volunteers are needed to prepare the meal at home, often a main dish or soup, salad, vegetable, and dessert. This is an opportunity to prepare your specialty. Contact is Sara Shank.

Coffee Hour- This is a Sunday morning commitment. Coffee Prep: Come to church 45 minutes early, prepare the coffee and set up in the narthex. Coffee Clean Up: Clean up both the coffee hour area in the narthex and in the kitchen. Both time slots are about 45 minutes to an hour. You are able to attend the church service and/or listen to it as it is broadcast in the kitchen. This task is done with one other person. There is a sign-up sheet in the kitchen or see Jerry Rothacker

Funeral Meals - These meals and/or receptions are held as needed. You can make desserts and/or other foods. Help is also needed for serving and/or clean up. Contact is Ginny Kleppinger.

Hospitality - Special events, lunches, receptions, etc. Days and times vary. You are needed to help with food preparation, room set up, serving and/or clean up. An hour or more as needed. Contact is Linda Brackbill.
